New Eagle Print to be unveiled at Homecoming 2000

Regal and majestic, the eagle soars across the sky, circling the water. He glides effortlessly to a perch on a tree branch where he can survey the surroundings below.

He is swift, powerful, graceful and observant.

More recognizable than many other species of birds, the adult bald eagle, or *Haliaeetus leucocephalus* has a distinctive white or "bald" head and a dark brown body. The beak, legs and eyes are yellow.

Protective and loyal, the eagle mates for life. Even though they may travel many miles, the eagle couple often returns to the same location, year-after-year to raise a family, utilizing their original home by making only minor repairs to the nest.

Morehead State University was looking for a symbol that depicted pride and strength when the eagle was chosen as its mascot in 1926. Since that time, the eagle has appeared on numerous items displayed by MSU students and alumni to express support for their alma mater. In the coming weeks, they will be given another opportunity to display this impressive bird in the home or office.

MSU has commissioned alumnus John Ward of Mt. Sterling to produce a new official, full-color eagle print. An unveiling is scheduled for Friday, Oct. 20, as part of the Athletic Hall of Fame Banquet during the Homecoming activities. The program begins at 7:30 p.m. in the Crager Room of the Adron Doran University Center.

Ward has been working on the print, titled "Eagle Lake Homecoming" for nearly six weeks. Completed in oils, the scene features a mighty eagle perched in the foreground, with another eagle in flight against the backdrop of the University's Eagle Lake.

Alumnus completes task for his Alma Mater

An introduction to the world of art came when he was still a pre-schooler.

Growing up in Ripley, Ohio, John Ward sat on his father's knee while he saw his dad make covered bridges and murals appear on canvas. Sometimes he got to provide assistance with his paintbrush.

As a youth, he did sketches for newspapers and designs for proms. He learned he could earn extra money by selling his handiwork when one of his paintings of a covered bridge earned him \$100.

When the time came to select a program of study, art would not be his choice. Instead, Ward chose the industrial technology program at Morehead State University. He earned an associate degree in mining technology in 1981 and a Bachelor of Science degree in industrial technology in 1984.

While experiencing college life, Ward was involved in those activities that are common to young adults. He studied, fulfilled degree requirements, took karate lessons under Virgil Davis' instruction, and joined a fraternity. His life would change when a Pi Kappa Phi fraternity brother introduced him to a coed named Susan Copher ('83) who was studying journalism at MSU.

After four years of dating, the duo decided to get married. The couple traveled across the country where Ward worked as an engineer designer, design-

“There’s No Place Like Homecoming 2000”

with Recognition, Reunions and Reminiscing

Six individuals who made outstanding contributions to the Eagle athletic program will be inducted into the Morehead State University Athletic Hall of Fame during ceremonies on Friday, Oct. 20, during the University’s “There’s no place like Homecoming 2000” activities.

Reservations for the 7:30 p.m. banquet, which will be held in the Crager Room of the Adron Doran University Center, may be made by calling the MSU Alumni Association at (606) 783-2080 or toll free at (800) 783-ALUM.

The newest members of the Athletic Hall of Fame are Rex Chaney (golf and baseball coach), Dan Gooch of Utica (football), Chester Greene of Georgetown, Ohio, (track and cross country), John High of Jackson (football), Robin Harmon-Newsome of Lovely (women’s basketball) and Dr. Mohammed Sabie (soccer coach).

Additionally, MSU cheerleading coach Myron Doan and MSU bowling club coach Larry Wilson will receive special recognition.

Chaney, in his 24th season as MSU golf coach, has been named league Coach of the Year four times. His teams have won four Ohio Valley Conference championships.

An MSU graduate (‘57) and long-time faculty member, Chaney also spent six seasons as the Eagle baseball coach, leading his team to a 111-56 record. His baseball teams won four division crowns and one conference championship and Chaney was named OVC Baseball Coach of the Year in 1963. He also spent four seasons as an assistant basketball coach.

Gooch (‘83) lettered four years in football and later spent two years as an assistant coach at his alma mater. Considered one of the finest linebackers ever to wear the Eagle uniform, he was first-team All-OVC in 1982 and second-team All-OVC in 1980. He holds the record at MSU for the most defensive plays in a game and in a season, and most individual tackles in a game and in a season.

Greene (‘54) lettered three years in track and in cross country. He won the very first OVC cross country meet in 1953.

A pioneer in the early days of track and cross country at the University, Greene was a two-time all

conference runner and remains a staunch supporter of the University and Eagle athletics.

Named All-OVC on two occasions, **High** (‘72) earned four letters as a wide receiver on the Eagle football team.

He led MSU in receptions twice, in receiving yardage twice and in touchdowns scored once. High still holds the MSU record for career receiving yardage (1,995).

Harmon-Newsome was a four-year starter and a four-year letter winner for the Lady Eagle basketball program. She ranks fourth on MSU’s all-time scoring list and fifth on MSU’s all-time assist list.

She led the Lady Eagles in assists in 1978-79. During her career, MSU teams were 86-36. She scored 34 points against Brigham Young University and 31 points against Northern Kentucky University.

Dr. Sabie, regarded as the “Father of Soccer” in Kentucky, began the soccer program at MSU in 1964 and led the Eagles to numerous state championships.

A long-time faculty member at MSU, Dr. Sabie has served in various capacities for several different countries at the Olympic Games. Author of two textbooks on the sport of soccer, he is respected worldwide as an authority on the game.

Doan (‘71) has coached MSU’s cheerleading squad to 11 national championships, including 10 consecutive wins. He currently serves the University as dean of students.

Wilson (‘65), a long-time faculty and staff member, has coached the Eagle bowling club to national championships, including the women’s third national win this year, and recently accompanied the squad to China.

The unveiling of the new eagle print by alumnus John Ward of Mt. Sterling will be a part of the evening’s ceremony. The full-color print, signed by the artist, will be available for purchase throughout the weekend.

MSU’s Homecoming activities get underway on Thursday, Oct. 19, with the Homecoming Parade at 6:30 p.m. A community pep rally at Jayne Stadium will conclude the event.

The Alumni Association will host a Welcome Reception on Friday from 5 to 7 p.m. at the Ramada Inn in Morehead. To be part of the fun, make plans now to

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Teresa Johnson new SGA President

Teresa S. Johnson, a Jackson, Ohio, senior, at Morehead State University will remember the year as one filled with achievements.

After serving last year as vice president for administration on the Student Government Association, she was elected to the top office for the 2000-2001 academic year. As president of SGA, she will be the student representative on the University's Board of Regents.

During her term in office, Johnson plans to concentrate on student concerns and build relationships with faculty and staff. She is promoting the campus as a friendly place where there is always interaction between students and faculty and staff.

Living more than two hours from home, Johnson has had the opportunity to see first-hand what it is like to stay on campus when classes are finished for the week. She plans to push for more weekend activities and special programs that would encourage student involvement. Already underway is an effort to increase school spirit at athletic events with the "Morehead Mob" which will sponsor tailgate activities before and after sporting events.

Johnson also hopes to see student organizations get more involved in campus life. She is working with the president of the Residence Hall Association to

increase awareness of the annual campus giving campaign. She also is hoping that there will be many groups building floats for the Homecoming parade, which is being reinstated this year.

A member of Kappa Delta sorority, Johnson recently received the Corre Stegall Award, the highest national honor that can be bestowed on a member. She expressed surprise when chapter president Holly DeMint called her from the national leadership conference in California to tell her she was the winner. She had completed the nomination form in March and sent it along with letters of recommendation from an alumni member, the collegiate province president, and DeMint.

"The award is based on academics, leadership and recommendations," she said.

A health promotions major with a minor in psychology and government, Johnson plans to work in a public health department after graduation. "I want to work in a community setting and have that one-on-one contact with people," she said. "I would like to have the opportunity to change (the life) of at least one person."

The daughter of Robert and Amy Johnson, she is a member of Phi Sigma Pi honor fraternity, the Order of Omega, RHA and the Student Alumni Ambassadors. □

Dr. Betty Porter retires



Dr. Betty M. Porter, a four-time graduate and 29-year classroom veteran of Morehead State University, has retired from her post as chair of the Department of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences.

A Greenup County native, Dr. Porter came to the University as a clinical instructor in the Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN) program in 1971. At that time, she and Sr. Thomasina were the program's only faculty members.

"I've taught almost all the courses in the program, but my focus has been parent-child nursing," said Dr. Porter, who holds the rank of professor emeritus. She continued to teach classes even while serving as chair of the department, first from 1983-1992 and again from 1995 to the end of June, only taking time off to complete additional training.

From 1992 to 1995, Dr. Porter was enrolled in the University of Kentucky's Post Graduate Scholars Program to become a family nurse practitioner. During her retirement she plans to work several days a week as a nurse practitioner at the medical office of her husband, Dr. Arvis Porter, where she had been working three days each month. "I already have my own patients," Dr. Porter said.

From the humble beginnings, MSU's health care degree offerings have grown to include a Bachelor of Science (BSN) degree in nursing and an Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degree and a Bachelor of Science (BS) in radiologic sciences. Today, there are 22 faculty members in the department.

As the department grew, so did Dr. Porter's workload. She served as a liaison for a cooperative master's degree program in the nurse practitioner program between UK and MSU. In recent years, she also worked to link MSU with Maysville Community College and Ashland Community College, establishing Two-Plus-Two programs in nursing at those locations.

Each year, the department adds 30 students each into ADN and radiological technology programs and 40 students into the BSN program. Currently, there are more than 50 students in the ADN program.

Approximately 50 students are in pre-nursing, which includes freshmen that want to enter the BSN program and approximately 85 students in the BSN program. There are more than 100 students in the radiological sciences program.

Of all the positions she has held, Dr. Porter describes her most rewarding moments as "seeing students go on to be successful," especially non-traditional students. In many cases, "graduation from the program really means a better life for those individuals.

"I will miss interaction with the students the most," she added. She earned Bachelor of Science ('71) and Master of Science ('74) degrees in biology at MSU, as well as a Master of Arts ('78) degree in higher education with an emphasis in biology. She later received an Ed.S. degree in higher education/biology from the University. □

ing highways and bridges in Florida, North Carolina and Indiana.

When his wife wanted to return to college for a degree in a health care field, the family moved to their current home in Mt. Sterling. Ward accepted a position with Quest Engineers in Lexington and began painting to increase the family's income.

Early on, he did art for hunting magazines, with a number of catalogs selling out of his prints. His first oil painting was a hunting scene with quail as the main focus. Then he did a series of beagle prints, which sold out in seven months. "I got the reputation of being a beagle artist," Ward said.

His works were mostly local scenes, paintings made from photographs he had taken.

He has received accolades from the National Wild Turkey Foundation, the Trout Stamp competition and the Kentucky Mountain Horse Association. He was encouraged when a painting of a John Deere farm scene received high praise at the Ohio Tobacco Festival; a watercolor took the best mixed-media award at the Kentucky State Fair; and a painting of wolves gave him a national title.

By winning awards at the state and national level, Ward was gaining recognition in the arts circle. Numerous others are joining his parents, John and Ruby Ward, in decorating their homes with his prints.

Along with the accomplishments comes notoriety and Ward often finds himself the subject of live broadcasts and newspaper interviews. He has appeared on Kentucky Educational Television and in the local newspaper as well as "Kentucky Life" and "Kentucky Afield."

Ward believes the next year will be even busier. He has accepted a variety of commissions, among them a painting of Camp McKee for Boy Scouts of America, and pieces for the Central Kentucky Kidney Foundation and Shriners Hospital. Two of his coin designs were among the seven finalists, from a field of 1,800 entries, which will determine the Kentucky

quarter being released by the U.S. Mint.

Now his work is available in more than 250 galleries from New York to Oregon, in private collections and offices of congressmen and national headquarters. In the coming months, he plans to broaden the market for his work by selling online.

While balancing his work and art, Ward finds time for outdoor photography, horseback riding and participating on the company softball team. These activities are all scheduled around time with his wife and two children: Courtney, 13, and Brandon, 9. □
